

ARABIAN'S

A complex predicate in Arabic is a verb phrase that includes a main verb and one or more auxiliary verbs. The construction of these phrases is highly flexible, allowing for a wide range of meanings and grammatical functions. The structure of these phrases is often determined by the position of the auxiliary verbs relative to the main verb. For example, the phrase *yaqra'u kitaban* 'reads a book' is a simple predicate, while *yaqra'u kitaban bi-ḥusn* 'reads a book well' is a complex predicate. The auxiliary verb *bi-* 'with' is used to indicate the manner of the action.

INDONESIAN

The formation and composition of complex predicates in Indonesian is a topic of ongoing research. The structure of these phrases is often determined by the position of the auxiliary verbs relative to the main verb. For example, the phrase *dia membaca buku* 'he reads a book' is a simple predicate, while *dia membaca buku dengan baik* 'he reads a book well' is a complex predicate. The auxiliary verb *dengan* 'with' is used to indicate the manner of the action.

RUSSIAN

Complex predicates in Russian are formed by combining a main verb with one or more auxiliary verbs. The structure of these phrases is often determined by the position of the auxiliary verbs relative to the main verb. For example, the phrase *он читает книгу* 'he reads a book' is a simple predicate, while *он читает книгу хорошо* 'he reads a book well' is a complex predicate. The auxiliary verb *хорошо* 'well' is used to indicate the manner of the action.

Simple predicate (SP)
 A SP is a combination of a verb and a subject. It is the simplest form of a predicate. For example, *he reads* is a simple predicate.

Complex predicate (CP)
 A CP is a combination of a verb, a subject, and one or more auxiliary verbs. It is a more complex form of a predicate. For example, *he reads well* is a complex predicate.

PRELIMINARY FINDINGS

The findings of this study suggest that the structure of complex predicates in Russian is highly flexible and can be used to convey a wide range of meanings. The auxiliary verbs used in these phrases are often determined by the position of the main verb. For example, the phrase *он читает книгу* 'he reads a book' is a simple predicate, while *он читает книгу хорошо* 'he reads a book well' is a complex predicate. The auxiliary verb *хорошо* 'well' is used to indicate the manner of the action. The findings also suggest that the structure of complex predicates in Russian is similar to that of other languages, such as Indonesian and Arabic.

A Reference Grammar of Puyuma, an Austronesian Language of Taiwan Stacy Fang-Ching Teng, 2008 The Puyuma people reside in southeastern Taiwan in Taitung City and Peinan Township in Taitung County There are still fourteen extant Formosan Austronesian languages in Taiwan but only thirteen indigenous groups are officially recognised by the Taiwanese
