Dancing Revelations Thomas F. DeFrantz, 2004-01-15 In the early 1960s the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater was a small multi racial company of dancers that performed the works of its founding choreographer and other emerging artists By the late 1960s the company had become a well known African American artistic group closely tied to the Civil Rights struggle

DeFrantz examines the most celebrated Ailey dances, including *Revelations*, drawing on video recordings of Ailey's dances, published interviews, oral histories, and his own interviews with former Ailey company dancers.
