Use, or any number ending in uno, drops the final *o* when followed by a masculine noun: *un libro*, *veintiún profesores*.

## RULES OF STRESS

- When a word ends in a vowel, *n* or *s*, the stress falls on the next to the last syllable: *ca* **sa** *ba* (horse), *ca* **sa** *ma* (cousin), *ca* **sa** (they).
- When a word ends in a consonant, except *n* or *s*, the stress falls in the last syllable: *ca* *sa* **ba** (Spanish), *ca* *sa* **da** (city).
- When the pronunciation of a word does not conform to any of the above rules, a written accent is required to indicate which syllable to stress: *ca* *sa* **á** (coffee), *ca* *sa* **á** (tree).
- Sometimes written accents are used to distinguish the function or the meaning between two words with the same spelling:
  - ca* (you, familiar, subject pronoun) and *ca* (you, possessive adjective)
  - ca* (verb to give) and *ca* (preposition)
  - ca* (you) and *ca*
- Certain possessives such as *que*, *quien*(s), *cual*(es), *cualquiera*, *cualquiera*(s) and certain adverbs such as *cualquiera* and *donde*, when used as interrogatives, have a written accent: ¿*Cualquiera* *es* *un* *restaurante*? ¿*Cualquiera* *vienen*?

## SYLLABIFICATION

- A vowel or a vowel combination can constitute a syllable.
  - Diphthongs and triphthongs are considered single vowels and cannot be divided: *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma*-*ca* (student); *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma*-*ca* (grandmother).
- Two strong vowels (*a*, *e*, *o*) do not form a diphthong and are separated into two syllables: *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (job); *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (family).
- A written accent on a weak vowel (*i*, *u*) breaks the diphthong:
  - Then the vowels are separated into two syllables: *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (woman); *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (day).
- A single consonant forms a syllable with the vowel that follows it: *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (doll); *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (book).
- None: *ca* is considered a single consonant: *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (house).
- When two consonants appear between two vowels, they are separated into syllables: *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (Thursday); *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (letter).
  - Exception: if *b*, *v*, *d*, *f*, *g*, *p* or *r* are followed by *l* or *ll* or *ch* or *ch* or *ch*, *a*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (house).
- When three consonants appear between two vowels, only the last one is included in the following syllable: *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (restaurant); *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (to transfer).
  - Exception: if *b*, *v*, *d*, *f*, *g*, *p*, or *r* are followed by *l* or *ll* or *ch* or *ch*, *a*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (house); *ca*-*sa*-*da*-*ma* (dinosaur).

## CAPITALIZATION

- Only the first word in a sentence and proper nouns are capitalized.
  - El señor García viajó a los Estados Unidos el día de ayer de 1993. (Mr. García traveled to the United States on May 2, 1993).

## NOUNS AND ADJECTIVES

- Nouns and adjectives
  - Determining nationality, religious affiliation, number of languages, months of the year, and days of the week are generally not capitalized.
- Nouns
  - Countries, persons, continents, and the first word of a title are normally capitalized.

## NOUNS GENDER

Nouns are either feminine or masculine, whether they refer to a person, place, thing or quality, and are usually accompanied by an article.

- Most nouns ending in *-o* are masculine: *el libro* (the book), but there are exceptions such as *la mano* (the hand), *la moto* (the motorcycle).
- Some nouns ending in *-ma* which refer to non-concrete things are masculine: *el clima* (the climate), *el drama* (the drama), *el idioma* (the language), *el poeta* (the poet), *el problema* (the problem), *el programa* (the program), *el sistema* (the system), *el tema* (the theme).
- Most nouns ending in *-a* are feminine: *la mesa* (the table), with exceptions such as *el mapa* (the map), *el día* (the day).
- Nouns ending *-ista*, *-dad*, *-dad*, *-dad*, *-ción* are feminine: *la artista* (the actress), *la aprobación* (the approval), *la ciudad* (the city), *la libertad* (the freedom), *la prevención* (the youth), *la muchachada* (the crowd).

## PLURAL

- If the noun ends in:
  - a vowel, add *-es*: *libros*/*libros*, *puerta*/*puertas*
  - a consonant, add *-es*: *guarda*/*guardas*, *profesor*/*profesores*
  - o*, change it to *-os* and add *-es*: *hijo*/*hijos*, *huevo*/*huevos*

## ARTICLES

- Agree in gender and number with the noun that they accompany.
- Definite articles (*el, la, los, las* (the)) use:
    - With infinitives used as nouns, particularly at beginning of a sentence: *El estudiar es bueno*. (Studying is good.)
    - With nouns found in a series: *Paño de libro, el cuaderno y la pluma sobre la mesa*. (I put the book, the notebook and the pen on the table.)
    - With certain nouns such as *escuela*, *corte*, *ciudad* where English uses the article: *Los hermanos van a la ciudad*. (The boys go to the city). *Los chicos aprenden mucho en la escuela*. (Children learn a lot in school.)
    - To identify an inanimate concept: *La bondad es una virtud*. (Kindness is a virtue.)
    - To identify something specific that precedes a demonstrative adjective: *El muchacho que me enseñó*.

## DEFINITE ARTICLES

- With nouns that have not been [yet] named: *El chico que me enseñó*. (The stranger who one dollar per person.)
- With titles, ranks, and professions when used with a possessive noun: *El doctor García*. (Dr. García called.)
- With names of a subject: *Estudio la historia*. (I study history.)
- With days of the week to indicate when something occurs, where we see "on" in English: *A veces vamos al cine el sábado*. (Sometimes we go to the movies on Saturday.)
- With parts of the body or articles of clothing, especially if the possessor is clearly indicated as in the case of reflexive verbs: *Me pongo el abrigo*. (I put on my coat.)
- With the seasons of the year: *En la primavera there much*. (In spring it rains a lot.)
- For some professions: *El abogado me ha llamado está en el momento*. (The lawyer is calling in at the moment.)
- With names of certain cities, countries, and continents: *Argentina, los Estados Unidos, la Habana, la América del Sur*.
- With a proper noun modified by an adjective: *el pequeño José* (Little Joseph).
- With a noun in apposition with a pronoun: *Nosotros los norteamericanos* (We North Americans).
- Proverbs bear when telling time: *Es la hora*. (It is one o'clock.)  
Note: The masculine singular form of the definite article, *el*, is used before certain feminine nouns that begin with stressed *o* or *h*: *el agua* (water), *el agua* (water).
- Indefinite articles
  - un, una, unos, unas* (a, some) normally precede a noun.
  - In specific cases an article is not used:
    - After a form of the verb *ser* (to be) when the noun following it is not modified: *Trigo profesor es*. (Trigo was never a professor.)

## ADVERBS

- Modify a verb, an adjective or another adverb.
  - So form an adverbial phrase to form singular forms of adjective: *mucho* - *mucho* (correctly).
  - An adverb precedes the adjective it modifies but normally follows the verb it modifies: *Los profesores son muy inteligentes*. (The professor is very intelligent); *Ellos pronuncian bien*. (They pronounce well.)

## COMPARATIVES AND SUPERLATIVES

- Inequality
  - Formed by placing *más* or *menos* before and *que* after the adjective, adverb or noun: *Nilda es más alta que Elena* (Nilda is taller than Elena); *Rosa es más inteligente que yo* (Rosa is more intelligent than I).
  - Irregular forms: *bueno*, *mejor* (good, better); *mucho*, *más* (that, more); *grande*, *mayor* (big, bigger or older)
- Equality
  - Formed by using *tan* followed by an adjective or adverb plus *como*: *Enfadado es tan inteligente como Elena*. (Enfadado is as intelligent as Elena.)
  - Irregular forms: *bueno*, *igual* (good, as good); *mucho*, *tanto* (that, as much); *grande*, *igual* (big, as big).
